



Learning to Live: Masonry as a Way of Life



What comes to mind when you think of a philosopher? Most people think of an Academic Philosopher—a person who has attained the level of PhD in a subject which has little value to the average person. Philosophers speak of things like Metaphysics, Axiology, Logic, Aesthetics, Epistemology, Ethics and Political Philosophy. The stereotype of the philosopher is very much that of a person attempting to discern, "How many angels can dance on the head of a pin?" In other words, a person devoted to obscure intellectual problems that have no bearing on the lives of most people and yet, this was not always the case. For much of its history philosophy was a very practical enterprise.

Philosophy was not so much a matter of the academy as it was a way of life. A Philosopher and Historian of Science who argues this point is Pierre Hadot. Hadot begins his essay, Philosophy as a Way of Life, with a quote from Philo of Alexandria from the first half of the first century BCE:

Every person—whether Greek or barbarian—who is in training for wisdom, leading a blameless, irreproachable life, chooses neither to commit injustice nor return it unto others, but to avoid the company of busybodies, and hold in contempt the places where they spend their time—courts, councils, marketplaces, assemblies—in short, every kind of meeting or reunion of thoughtless people. As their goal is a life a peace and serenity, they contemplate nature and everything found within her: they attentively explore the earth, the sea, the air, the sky, and every nature found therein. In thought they accompany the moon, the sun, and the rotations of the other stars, whether fixed or wandering. Their bodies remain on earth, but they give wings to their souls, so that, rising into the ether, they may observe the powers which dwell there, as is fitting for those who have truly become citizens of the world. Such people consider the whole world as their city, and its citizens are the companions of wisdom; they have received their civic rights from virtue, which has been entrusted with presiding over the universal commonwealth. Thus, filled with every excellence, they are accustomed no longer to take account of physical discomforts or exterior evils, and they train themselves to be indifferent to indifferent things; they are armed against both pleasures and desires, and, in short they always strive to keep themselves above passions…"

The point of Hadot's book was that, while today philosophy is an academic discipline like chemistry or art history – the sort of thing people study and write academic papers in – philosophy in the ancient world was something quite different. It was, to be sure, quite intellectual, but being a philosopher was, primarily, a way of living. In fact, there were a number of ancient philosophical traditions, each with its own way of life, in the Greco-Roman world (Platonism, Aristotelianism, Skepticism, Stoicism, Epicureanism, to name a few), and others in parts of the world like China (Confucianism, Taoism, Moism) and India (Vedic philosophies and Buddhism, which of course spread to other parts of the world). In fact, Hadot points out that early Christianity was often viewed in the Roman world as a philosophical school with a distinctive set of teachings and way of life. Think Justin Martyr and the Monastic Schools. What made one a philosopher, a lover of wisdom, was not the religious tradition one inhabited (just as is the case today, most people in the ancient world were theists), but the way of life one embodied and the practices one took on. As the Philosopher Epictetus writes: A carpenter does not come up to you and say, "Listen to me discourse about the art of carpentry," but he makes a contract for a house and builds it... Do the same thing yourself. Eat like a man, drink like a man... get married, have children, take part in civic life, learn how to put up with insults, and tolerate other people."

Philosophy in the classical world was a practical affair. It was a therapeutic of life that provided philosophical or spiritual exercises by which one disciplined the reason and passions. The early philosophers used a whole host of spiritual exercises to help move the philosopher towards this end. But what does all of this have to do with the practice of Freemasonry? Well, pretty much everything! Masonry as we have received it very much embodies these qualities of a philosophy. Masonry is not a Religion, so much as it is a way of life. While masonry may be called "Speculative" these days, it is far from being a purely intellectual affair. The Craft is to be used and embodied. To speak as Epictetus did earlier, the mason does not come up to you and say, 'Listen to me discourse about the art of masonry.' No, the mason works, builds, forms and fashions his mind as a living stone for that "Spiritual building—that house not made with hands—eternal in the heavens."
